Bridge Builders: Weekly on Thursdays (5:15 - 6:30pm)

CSJD x The Center for Religion, Spirituality, & Pluralism

Bridge Builders is a cohort-based experience that invites students into a semester-long opportunity to build dialogue skills focused on tense and hot-button issues connected to religion and spirituality.

Crafting Your Story: 3/30 (3:30 - 5pm), 4/7 (Noon - 2pm)

Peer-Led Program by Facilitation Fellows

Crafting Your Story explores storytelling as a powerful practice rooted in identity, culture, and community. At CYS events, participants will reflect upon and share their own cultural stories, create their own craft project, and learn how cultures around the world have used crafting, such as stitching, beading, quilting, and other art forms, to tell and preserve stories.

Peer-Led Program by Facilitation Fellows

Media Bytes invites participants to engage social justice topics through shared media and meaningful dialogue. In this series, we listen to short “bytes” of podcasts, films, or TV clips, or songs and come together for guided conversation. Media Bytes encourages curiosity, critical listening, and collective reflection as we unpack complex issues, one byte at a time.

SistaCare is a community-care and dialogue group that explores the ways undergraduate and graduate students who identify as Black/Africana women and femmes, regardless of their gender expression, experience campus communities. Sessions will explore lived experience, impact, and connection.
