 - Helps provide strategic direction and standardize data management across all executive branches in MD (e.g. Department of Transportation)

Strategies For Launching Your Career

- Be honest with yourself
 - Evaluate your personal strengths and values then align this with what you want to do

 - Consider life experience (internships, job experience, projects, etc)
 - Consider motivations → What do you want to get out of your work experience?
 - Utilize Career Center assessment resources

- Develop a plan
 - Lay out SMART goals to establish a realistic roadmap
- Build a network
 - Still look at job postings but also leverage your network
 - Network can consist of friends, family, other students, ISSA, etc
 - Look to your network for connections to companies
 - Tips to build network

- LinkedIn - professional networking platform
 - Don't be afraid to reach out to people you don't know (e.g. industry experts)
 - Broadcast your interests
 - Get involved in your community
 - Find mentors - professors, industry mentorships
 - Participate in campus clubs and activities
- Use university resources
 - MD state departments have internship positions - MIIC program
 - MIIC Application: <https://mtip.umbc.edu/employers/apply/miic/>
 - Opportunities to work on high-profile projects
 - Resume building → schedule appointment with Career Center
 - Go to career fairs
 - Early job searches and internships lead to good jobs
- Take personal initiative
 - Step up, put yourself out there, and know it's okay to fail

Tech as a Career Choice

- Often working in agile teams developing innovative solutions for various projects
- Work has gotten more remote and flexible
 - Companies seek to maximize their teams' capabilities by letting them work the hours that work best for the teams
- Wide variety of IS-related jobs and certifications out there that lead to competitive and high-paying salaries

Value of Strong Communication

- Write in a way that your targeted audience will understand
 - Often don't need to get overly technical
- Oral communication
 - Consider your presentation skills when planning your career path but also keep in mind that it's beneficial to practice and strengthen oral communication skills
- Strong listening skills
 - What user says they want may not provide what they need
 - Be able to understand user specifications and recognize the unasked questions to ultimately deliver what user needs
