

# ~ THE PROGRAM

- Founded in 1971, Medieval Studies established an **undergraduate interdisciplinary program** in 1975 with the help of an NEH grant and later started a **MA program** which graduated its first student in 1992
- The program currently offers degrees of MA, BA, and a Doctoral Certificate in Medieval Studies
  and serves as many as 80 graduate students each year taking courses on medieval topics across
  all disciplines
- Our 38 faculty members (full-time, affiliated, and emeritus) are drawn from 8 related departments: Art History and Music, Classics, English, History, Modern Languages and Literatures, Philosophy, Political Science, and Theology
- We sponsor a medieval fellows program, which hosts up to 5 visiting scholars during the academic year and additional scholars during the summer session
- We host a variety of events each year, including a Spring and Fall Lecture Series, concerts, symposia, workshops, movie nights, and a major international conference each spring that draws scholars from around the world

## OUR STUDENTS

- Over 135 students have received MAs in Medieval Studies since 1992; 118 wrote Master's theses to complete the program requirements
- Over half of our MA students continue on to further study in prestigious PhD programs (in recent years these have included Princeton, Yale, John Hopkins, UNC Chapel Hill, Rutgers, NYU, Boston College, and Fordham). 20% of our students have gone on to PhD programs in related disciplines at Fordham
- Alumni also go on to professional schools (e.g. library or law school) or work in careers compatible with their medievalist training (libraries, museums, archives, rare book dealers, video game design, publishing, university administration, and more)
- The Center is part of New York's Inter-University Doctoral Consortium (IUDC), providing access to courses offered in member universities, and our students participate in the annual IUDC graduate conference
- The Center sponsors a student exchange program with the Centre for Medieval Studies in York, UK
