SOCIOLOGY 396

Reflections on Service-Learning & Community Engagement: A Sociological Perspective Spring 2022 Syllabus

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1. All students enrolled in PRAC 096 and who are involved in a Service-Learning & Community Engagement (SLCE) experience providing service through a Shriver Center-organized partnership are eligible to enroll in SOCY 396.

SOCY 396 is a 1-3-credit course that is graded **Pass/Fail** through which students may earn upper-level <u>elective</u> credits. The credit may <u>not</u> count toward requirements in Sociology.

SOCY 396 is contingent on the following:

- a. Enrollment is by permission of Michele Wolff, The Shriver Center.
- b. Students must be placed and enrolled in PRAC 096: Service-Learning & Community Engagement.
- 2. Course Requirements & Expectations:
 - a. A grade of Pass (P) in SOCY396 is contingent upon successful completion of the required hours of service as documented through PRAC096.
 - b. Students successfully completing SOCY396 will attain a greater understanding of their service-learning experience from a sociological perspective, particularly related to the concept of community, the media's role in society, and the connection of policy to service.
 - c. Learning Outcomes: By the end of the semester, students will:
 - Deepen their reflection on and, therefore their understanding of, concepts such as community, policy, engagement, and service-learning;
 - Enhance their appreciation for others' perspectives through class discussions, including reflections on interactions at their service-learning and community engagement sites;
 - Gain a deeper appreciation for the connection between their community engagement experiences and the assets and challenges in the larger community;
 - Engage in discussions with others more often and more comfortably about the concepts presented in the class;
 - Enhance their ability to explain the lessons they have learned through the course and their community engagement experiences and integrate these lessons to their other life experiences.
