Dr. Sosonya Jones is Associate Professor of Educational Leadership & Policy Studies in the School of Education at Howard University. Dr. Jones has almost twenty years of experience as an administrator, researcher, and educator in higher education. She teaches courses in higher education policy, governance, diversity and equity, and advanced qualitative methods. Her research interests focus on the nexus between policy and

practice for diversity, equity, and inclusion in higher education.



Dr. Ñusta Carranza Ko is Assistant Professor in the School of Public and International Affairs at the University of Baltimore. Dr. Ko's research interests include cross-regional research on human rights and transitional justice processes in Latin America and East Asia, including policies of memorialization in Peru and South Korea and questions of indigenous peoples' rights, namely forced sterilization, and indigenous

identities in Peru. She has conducted fieldwork in Peru, South Korea, and Brazil, and held visiting research positions.

Agency Review Team in Arts and Humanities. Recently she was inducted into the Academy of Community Engagement Scholarship, and in 2021, she was appointed to serve on the National Council on the Humanities.



Dr. Tiffaney Parkman is a lecturer in the School of Health and Human Services at the University of Baltimore. She has had a love for the mentally ill for well over a decade and has worked in almost every area of the helping field. From her experiences, she learned the critical role that family and having good family relationships play in all that we do. This led to her research interests focusing on families, prisoner
