Her most recent book, The Making of Our Bodies, Ourselves: How Feminism Travels Across Borders (Duke, 2007) builds a transnational history of the feminist self-health text, now abbreviated as OBOS. Triêu Thi Trinh was a Vietnamese warrior from the 3rd century who successfully resisted the occupying forces of the Wu Kingdom during their time in Vietnam. She was born in the Trieu Son district of Thanh Hoa province, which was controlled by the Eastern Wu Kingdom, one of China's three Kingdoms. Triệu Trinh managed to liberate an area of Vietnam which she then claimed as her own. By the age of 23 she had defeated at least 30 Wij advances.

Juana Inés de la Cruz was a self-taught scholar and poet of the Baroque school, and nun of New Spain. Although she lived in a colonial era when Mexico was part of the Spanish Empire, she is considered today a Mexican writer, and stands at the beginning of the history of Mexican literature in the Spanish language.

Phillis Wheatley was the first African American poet and first African-American woman to publish her writing. Born in Gambia, Senegal, she was sold into slavery at about age eight. She was purchased by the Wheatley family of Boston, who taught her to read and write, and encouraged her poetry. The publication of Wheatley's Poems on Various Subjects, Religious and Moral brought her fame in England and the Thirteen Colonies. In 1768, Wheatley wrote "To the King's Most Excellent Majesty," in which she praised George III for repealing the Stamp Act. As the American Revolution gained strength, Wheatley's writing turned to themes that expressed ideas of the
